Explaining Idioms

Idiom—a phrase that has meaning that cannot be determined from the words that make it up; the combination of words has a meaning all its own

Examples: missed the boat; see eye to eye

The person has taken on too many responsibilities.

5. You will be great in the talent show, Kara. Now, break a leg!

It means "good luck" or "do a good job."

6. The project that Mrs. Smith assigned us is a piece of cake.

It is very easy.

7. I have two tests tomorrow, so tonight, I really need to hit the books.

It means to study hard.
