Holding a pencil properly can be difficult for a child who does not yet have enough strength in his or her hands and fingers. Use these fine motor skill activities to help strengthen your child's hand and fingers. Help your child use relaxed rather than cramped movements as he or she writes. Demonstrate how to properly grip the pencil between the thumb and pointer finger, letting the pencil rest on the middle finger. Rolling play dough into tiny balls using only the finger tips. Using toothpicks to make designs in play dough. Tearing newspaper into strips and then crumpling them into balls. Lacing and sewing activities such as stringing beads. Using eye droppers to "pick up" water. Play with Legos, miniature cars, small blocks, action figures, and other small toys. Working puzzles construction paper to form pictures or designs. Preschool Scissors Skills Activities will exercise the very same muscles which are needed to hold and control a pencil.
